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# Names not to miss

In The Armory Show's Presents section, galleries founded no more than ten years ago exhibit artists solo or in pairs. Here are some faces to look out for





Eduardo Ponjuán (2, 1955) El Apartamento, Harana Bduardo Ponjuán's work which emerged during the 1980s, writes the inational history of Cuha at the same time as the artist is writing his personal one, the gallery says. For The Armony Show, he is exhibiting works from his series Snow Country, which presents a utopian reality that may be the country of his childhood or the country of his dreams, and some pieroes made of a sphah on plywood ("I would prefer not to" and "O rose, thou art sick" that position fragments of well-known poems against a rough and dark surface. Chihota's very personal works, which often use földoric and religious symbolism, cyclore black female subjectivity and deal with themes such as grief, child-baseting and faith in the series of Tage monoprims she is showing at the fair, Kumira Mutartos (Wating in Faith), female bodies are semi-abstracted in colocurity Jatterns and forms, some becoming womb-like, VS.R.

The stand at The Armony Show will present wall works and sculpture, made over the past year from recycled and found materials such as seashelb and clothing worn by sanitation workers, *MK*
